Remarks from past deans

Catherine Walker dean from 1974-1975 and 2009-2012

In July, 2009 I was elected Dean of the SJV/AGO Chapter. I had finished out a year's term of a previous Dean in 1974, but that year had no special memories connected to it. My first activity was attending the Regional Convention in Phoenix, AZ. There was so much motivation connected with being at that convention, that I happily took on my duties. Here are some highlights of these three years:

- Members enjoyed the 2nd Annual Organ spectacular at the Warner's Theatre and it was indeed spectacular! Ten students were enthralled with the organ and with Richard Cencibaugh's presentation. The following two years the activity continued as Warner's Open Console.

- The three Hymn Festivals during these years were very well attended and enjoyed. Our directors these three years were Dr. Roy Klassen with the San Joaquin Chorale at University Presbyterian Church and Fowler First Presbyterian Church, and Dr. Julie Carter, with her choir and brass ensemble at First Presbyterian Church. We were always excited to see our members take part as organists for the hymns, and special music.

- Our Organ Artist Series recitalists continued with two concerts each year; Christoph Bull, Carol Terry, James David Christie, Angela Kraft Cross, Ty Woodward and Dr. Alison Luedecke. Members were thrilled with their expertise and musicianship.

- A special recital, "Six Guys and a Doll" with student organists from our chapter reminded us how important it was to spotlight these "up and coming" musicians. The"Doll" is now an active member of our chapter, Hannah Zentner! Members Laurell Huber, Jacquie Johnson and Helga Medd deserve so much credit for giving extra volunteer hours to plan and carry out Central CA Young Perform-ance Awards, Pipe Organ Experience and Pedal Pushers. POEx had 42 students enjoying the Martin Ott organ at CSUF.

- In addition, member recitals, a workshop with composer/pianist Kevin Memley, Guild Sunday services, and the annual Twelfth Night Social were very enjoyable.

During these three years I especially remember two "reasons for being a member" that I tried to promote. Our chapter runs on volunteers. Some members are willing to give back to this organization that has benefitted them and provided inspiration. Others are just sitting on the sidelines. I feel certain that those who volunteer to expand their skills and contribute to our chapter, benefit from their membership and our shared experience in many ways. In addition, I encouraged organist friends to "Live Your Life Splendidly!" This was not original with me, but the quote is from the armless pianist, Liu Wei. He accomplishes the amazing feat of playing with his toes by imagining the positive results from that quote. I do not know the Chinese word for splendid but the beauty and punch of the word was enough to spur me on to three splendid years with my organist friends.

Faye E. DeLong dean from 1984-1986 and 1991-1994

I served from 1984 to 1986 and again from 1991 to 1994. I had good and competent board members, many of whom are still active now. We all planned and carried out the usual activities, i.e. member recitals, Guild Sunday programs, hosted many Organ Artist Series concerts, etc. Our AGO chapter is fortunate to have members who were and are so willing to carry on the work of an AGO chapter.

Laurell Huber dean from 1996-1998 and 2012-2014

It is amazing for me to realize how I have been personally affected by our San Joaquin Valley Chapter for 65 of its 75 years (a majority of its existence!). Chapter member/teachers who have generously mentored me at the organ since childhood are Miriam Tietjen (Michael Hembd's mom), Eunice Kronberg, Lee Burtner, and Aran Vartanian.

-My memories over the years are a blend of really good people and outstanding programs. We are family! -My earliest excitement for the Guild began at very informative master classes held at First Congregational Church covering Johannes Brahms through William Albright.

-A chapter highlight for me was a tour of a wide variety of organs in the Bay Area, carefully arranged by Dean Aran Vartanian and other colleagues.

I was fortunate in my early years as a board member to observe and learn from our departed "Angel" Deans Margaret Larwood, Richard Galloway, Richard Cencibaugh, Ardelle Bakkegard, Aran Vartanian, and Zella Woods in their expertise at directing the various issues of chapter business, each in his or her own way.

Our chapter formerly had the resource of a chaplain which I found to be a great blessing, especially in Rev. Frank Baldwin. He was a very enthusiastic supporter and enabler to

the activities of our chapter, always bending over backward to offer assistance.



Ruth Andersen dean from 2004-2009
